AMERICA250MI DIGITIZING GRANT



WTHS was awarded a grant from the America250MI Program in June. The program, funded by the Michigan Legislature, joins others nationwide in commemorating the 250th anniversary of the founding of the US. The \$5000 grant provides

funds to purchase equipment and software to digitize WTHS historical documents, audio files, archives, catalog our artifacts and museum displays.



This new access will help us bring out more stories and facts telling how the pioneering spirit, courage and resourcefulness of our area's settlers and farmers allowed them to survive, thrive and fuel the future.

We'll be starting the digitizing process soon. We're looking for volunteers to join in these efforts. Interested in digging into history or would just like to help? Computer skills are good but not necessary.

Eagle Scout Project

WTHS has a long history of working with local Boy Scouts of America troops. Troop 447 has played a major role in the moving and restoration of our Village buildings. It's amazing what they've done for us!



We are now working with Ty Cottrell of Troop 448 of Dexter on an Eagle Scout Service Project: restoring the historic 3-hole privy near the Podunk School, which has started to fall victim to the elements. After talking with WTHS representatives, he has delivered impressively detailed planning documents telling how he and his Troop 448 team will replace the cedar roof and restore and repair the siding, using historic period-type materials, and clean and paint the interior. Ty plans to start work this fall and complete it before the snow falls.

Pilot Field Trip Program Success!



Local Girl Scouts attended our pilot youth field trip program at the Village in mid-July. The day included historical lessons and activities that allowed the girls to experience what life was like in Webster Township's early days of settlement.

Activities focused on geography, economics, community problem solving, identifying museum artifacts, making wooden wheels, the roles of children at the turn of the 19th century, blacksmithing, a typical day at school in 1920, and the fight for women's rights. The girls also had the opportunity to try some old time games and homesteading skills on the Village Green.

RECIPE CORNER Great Grandma Fielder's Soft Sour Cream Sugar Cookies

This old fashioned soft sugar cookie recipe comes from the great grandmother of WTHS Admin. Assistant Debi Bailey. Great Grandma always kept fresh cookies in a crock at the bottom of the bakery cabinet so the little ones could help themselves. The secret ingredient here is a generous portion of freshly ground nutmeg! So good with a cup of coffee!

Soft Sour Cream Sugar Cookies

Combine together in a large bowl:

1 cup heavy cream

1 cup sour cream

1 tsp baking soda

Add and stir in sugar and eggs:

1 1/2 cups sugar

2 eggs


Combine dry ingredients in a separate bowl and add flour mixture to the wet ingredients in two parts.

4 cups flour

2 tsp baking powder

3/4 tsp salt

1 tsp grated nutmeg



350° oven, 10-15 minutes until edges are lightly browned and center springs to touch.



RECENT ACQUISITIONS

We recently accepted several items from Sara Cummings of Chelsea on behalf of her mother, **Barbara Ullman**: a 19th century-type 4-foot Walking Spinning Wheel; a 19th century handmade chair with needlework seat done by her grandmother and a Canadian WW1 Certificate that came from Canada when they immigrated to the US; and a selection of tatting.



It is planned that the Walking Wheel, now in the homemaker section of the Farm Museum, will be used to demonstrate thread and yarn spinning.

Janet Stanfield has donated a number of items from the Mast family barn: an old hand sickle for the garden display in the Old Town Hall, a pitchfork, Funk Corn seed sign for the Farm Museum, a wooden keg and washtub for the Homestead section of the Farm Museum.

Daryl Wright has donated two large stone grinding wheels. While provenance is unclear, the configuration is consistent with 19th century small mill wheels used in agricultural products processing. These will be displayed as part of the Farm Museum.




